Land cultivation in Tuscany has been a well organized activity since ancient times. This area is thus characterized by a large biodiversity







SURVEY, RECOVERY, CONSERVATION

Starting from the year 2010 a team focused of fruit plant biodiversity was formed by Province of Siena, University of Siena, Florence National Research Council of Italy and a private company (Co.Ge.P.)

Since then this group was able to collect fifty seven fruit accessions of several tree species within the Siena Province.










PRESENT AND FUTURE ACTIONS:

- 1. Valorization of antioxidant and nutraceutical content (i.e. phenols and vitamins) of old fruits to spread to consumers their healthy characteristics
- 2. Promotion of old varieties in the local environment for sustainable farming with low impact for their pest resistance
- 3. Use of old varieties in food industry creating a line of products strictly connected to each traditional location and place









Most ethnobotanical research reveals that traditional knowledge about local edible resources is suffering an alarming decline, especially in Europe

A recent study demonstrates that cultural values have a major effect on traditional local knowledge. Sustainable exploitation of local biodiversity is much more likely for resources that are emotionally valued than for those that are used in an impersonal way, as a source of income.

The Casolana apple case








